


The Trust staff work long hours under great pressure and achieve amazing results, despite being very under-resourced. Without them, there would be no Trust.

# CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

### 1. OVERVIEW

In the latter part of 1989 the Board of the Trust had to take further major steps to reverse operating losses which caused a disappointing result in terms of our cash position for the year. However, other actions improved our net consolidated assets. The support of the Commonwealth Bank has enabled The Trust to operate without utilising the guarantee generously offered in 1988 by the Seaborn Broughton & Walford Foundation. This guarantee was a very generous gesture in our hour of need.

Major achievements in 1989 were the establishment of Australian Business Support for the Arts (ABSA), the conduct of our first National Arts Week, and the establishment of new Trust premises in Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide and Perth.

In particular, the Founding Benefactors of Victoria should be praised for their assistance in establishing and furnishing our Melbourne office under Lady Potter's leadership.

The Trust was also responsible for some important cultural work during 1989, in particular Wolfmoon by the Theatre of the Deaf, Aida in Tokyo by the Elizabethan Sinfionetta, Hello, Pipe Dreaming, Doppio Teatro and Lipstick Dreams by the Australian Content Department and three excellent seasons of the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra.

Two initiatives established by the Trust in the past were transferred during the year to new independent arrangements. Firstly, the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra, after twenty two years with The Trust, has become the Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra. It should be an exciting new phase in the life of this excellent orchestra. The other departure was the sale of the Trust's costume hire and manufacturing business. This division evolved from theatrical activities over twenty-one years ago and had grown into a large commercial enterprise. A management buyout was negotiated with The Trust maintaining an interest in this business on a

mortgage basis.

The Trust will still administer the Elizabethan Sinfionetta. This is a high standard orchestra specialising in commercial, high profile events and recordings.

### 2. FINANCIAL MATTERS

It was necessary to implement severe cost reductions late in 1989 to stem costs which caused accumulated losses to rise from \$577,040 in 1988 to a consolidated amount of \$1,681,725 at the end of 1989. The action taken has stopped further losses.

To counter the effects of cash losses the Board of the Trust has proceeded with steps to rebuild its capital base. This involved the sale of the costume business in a management buy-out together with the negotiations associated with the airspace over the Independent Theatre. These two "below the line" items resulted in an improvement in the Asset Revaluation Reserve from \$687, 245 in 1988 to \$1,642,277 (consolidated) in 1989.

In summary, the consolidated net assets of the Trust have increased from \$110,205 in 1988 to \$254,431 in 1989.

The Trust is still in a difficult financial position. However, it is envisaged that the cash position will improve through 1990.

The major reason for the operating loss for 1989 was the very high interest rates incurred on losses accrued in prior years, and trading losses in the Donations processing division, and some other sections of operations.

These areas were brought under more strict control late in 1989 and are now performing according to budget for 1990.

The Commonwealth Government, through the Australia Council, has been extremely supportive to The Trust over the past years. It is also appreciated that The Trust received generous assistance from the NSW Ministry of the Arts, W.A Department for the Arts, S.A Department of the Arts and the Victorian Ministry for the Arts.

### 3. BOARD ISSUES

Andrew Briger AM, who retired as Chairman in 1989, led the Trust through one of its most difficult periods. He ensured that at all times the Board remained cohesive, helping the Trust in the period of recovery from a series of major losses resulting from earlier entrepreneurial activities. Andrew remains on the Board where his continuing contribution is appreciated.

I was honoured to succeed him as Chairman in September 1989, and am fortunate to have the backing of a dedicated Board with a staff who are energetic, enthusiastic and very hard working.

As Chairman of the ABSA Council (Australian Business Support for the Arts), which is a division of The Trust and supported by the Australia Council, I am most gratified to be assisted by a distinguished group of business leaders. Throughout Australia, current business sponsorship for the arts has reached \$47 million a year with a real growth rate of 9% per annum. ABSA will strive to encourage growth and development of this vital area of support for the arts.

I endorse Sir Ian Potter's statements on the importance of all the assistance we receive from people who generously give of their time, in particular, the State Boards and Members' Committees.

This year has seen two other changes to the National Board, with the departure of The Hon. Justice Legoe and Mr. David Mortimer. Both these gentlemen will be sorely missed, particularly Chris Legoe's forthright advocacy of the South Australian Board. I am happy to welcome Jessica Dames from South Australia. Jessica is a former Vice-President of the Council of Governors and is also responsible for the establishment of the very successful Literary Lunches in Adelaide.

## 4. STAFFING

The Trust's staff are enthusiastic and hardworking. This dedication is necessary to build the Trust's image and respect in the arts industry, the business sector and with Government.

The Chief Executive, Adam Salzer and the Finance Director, William Cottam, have contributed a great deal of hard work and leadership in these difficult times. Their efforts are important in the drive for the Trust to significantly reduce its dependency on Government funding over the next two years.

There are many staff members who should be mentioned and I commend all members to the staff list in this report.

### 5. CONCLUSION

The Trust remains in a critical period to reestablish itself as a relevant and viable arts organisation. The Board has taken steps to stabilise current financial performance. Other initiatives are under development to establish a secure basis for the future. It is important for these matters to be completed successfully during 1990 to provide a platform for the next decade.

# **CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REVIEW**

989 can be summarised as being very demanding on all concerned with The Trust. There was no part of the organisation that was not placed under extreme pressure through the year. However, the organisation never lost its sense of purpose or momentum during this difficult period.

Why was it such a hard year?

In any period of company turnaround, many adjustments are required, these are manifest in physical relocation, reduced staffing, new systems and constantly tightening financial controls.

What has been achieved?

The Trust is smaller and more efficient. It carries a much smaller overhead and has reached a point where all departments are responsible for their own "bottom line".

Each department achieved its goals for the year not necessarily financially but artistically and administratively. Financial controls were put in place during 1989 to ensure that financial targets are adhered to during 1990 and beyond.

I refer you to the following individual departmental reports for further details.

I would like to thank the staff, present and past, as well as all the people who have assisted for no financial reward. The contributions made by these volunteers range from the Boards and councils, to committees, bookings, clerical and arts industry representatives. Their support for The Trust is invaluable.

### THE TRUST

"The Trust" has now gained wide acceptance as the logo of The Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust. This promotional drive reflects the wide charter of our organisation.

The Trust, according to its charter, is a non-profit body which exists to foster and promote drama, opera, ballet, singing, music, painting, sculpture, craft work, community and ethnic arts, radio, films, television, literature, and visual arts in Australia.

These formal objectives have been summarised into our mission statement and goals as follows:

## MISSION STATEMENT INTO THE 1990'S

The Trust encourages the arts to flourish throughout Australia and ensures that all have the opportunity to enjoy these arts.

This can be achieved through community and financial environments in which excellence and innovation is encouraged in our creative artists.

The outcome will be the evolution of a distinctly Australian culture.

## **NEW DIRECTIONS**

#### 1. AUSTRALIAN BUSINESS SUPPORT FOR THE ARTS (ABSA)

Australian Business Support for the Arts (ABSA) is a prestigeous business organisation run by a Council of business leaders whose purpose is to encourage substantial increases in private sector support of the arts. This is to be done by addressing the barriers that prevent increased sponsorship. ABSA's clients are businesses not the arts industry. Arts bodies and artists will be the beneficiaries but are not the clients.

The work of ABSA was launched in Sydney, Canberra, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth in 1989. The reactions from the private and public sectors and the arts were extremely positive.

Issues addressed in 1989 include the establishment of ABSA (logo, staff, promotional material, advocacy video etc), the commissioning of detailed research into corporate sponsorship, training seminars in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne, the ABSA Report and commencement of research into an arts industry taxation policy.



The strength of ABSA is its Council. This group of individuals represent companies with established arts sponsorship projects. The Council members themselves are arts aficionados who believe the arts can benefit not only from corporate funding but also from business expertise.

ABSA is an initiative of the Australia Council and is managed by The Trust. Funds were also received from the National Arts Industry Training Council for the training seminars.

ABSA received support in 1989 from the following companies:

ANZ Trustees, Australian Airlines, BP Australia, Carlton United Breweries, Corrs Australia, Duesburys, Epson Australia, Esso Australia, Hill & Knowlton Australia, Isis Design, James Hardie Industries, Magnus Nancurvis & Curl, Shirley Spectra, Yann Campbell Hoare Wheeler and Wang Australia.

This service is managed by Adam Salzer and Jayne Binet.

#### 2. NATIONAL ARTS WEEK (NAW)

The concept of a National Arts Week was instituted in 1988 by the Australia Council. It was agreed that in 1989 the administration of NAW should pass to The Trust as The Trust was a national body with offices in 5 States and a wide arts network.

The 1989 NAW campaign was coordinated by Wendy Blacklock under the direction of Adam Salzer and Lynden Esdaile (Australia Council). The major theme, posters, radio and television advertisements were devised by Chiat Day Mojo. Little and Associates advertising agency co-ordinated nattionwide newspaper supplements.

NAW was opened by the Arts Minister, the Hon. Clyde Holding at Arthur Boyd's property, Bundanon. National highlights included the inaugural BP Arts Media Awards, a National Press Club address by James Strong, Meet An Artist campaign for all politicians and the launch of ABSA.

Perhaps some of the most exciting work for NAW was generated by the States' NAW programmes co-ordinated largely by The Trust's State Managers. These activities were multifarious but some deserve special mention:

Arts Ball, Queensland, Arts Industry Expo, South Australia, Swan Gold Theatre Awards, A Special Train, and National Arts Week Ball in Western Australia, Martin Place Rock Concert, New South Wales, Open Day at the National Gallery of Victoria and the opening events in all States.

NAW was supported by the Australia Council, all State Ministries for the Arts, Australian Airlines, Hilton International Adelaide, Yalumba Wines, Department for the Arts (South Australia), Adelaide Festival Centre, Carlton United Breweries and Tooheys Limited.

In 1990, National Arts Week will be managed by Elizabeth Greig.

#### 3. PATRONS OF THE TRUST

Sydney launched the Patrons of The Trust corporate membership programme in August 1989. This service is aimed at assisting businesses to use the arts for management level corporate entertainment. The Trust selects opening nights, previews or "special nights" of high profile shows. A supper is provided and arrangements are made for Patrons of The Trust to meet the cast of the show.

Duesburys Chartered Accountants were the first Patron as well as the first National Patron. The Patrons programme is up and running well in five States. There are a total of 14 companies participating.

This programme is managed by Michelle Stead and co-ordinated by The Trust State Managers.

# 4. INDEPENDENT THEATRE RESTORATION

The Trust purchased the Independent Theatre from Theatre Freeholds Limited early in 1988. Since that time extensive activity has taken place in researching this, Sydney's oldest surviving theatre, from its earliest days as a cable tram depot through its usage as a vaudeville venue, a boxing stadium and skating ring to its becoming the cradle for many of Australia's best actors and directors under Doris Fitton. Along the way, the Independent Theatre was also used as an ammunitions factory.

This diverse background has led to a very exciting design concept to be developed by architect Clive Lucas. The restored theatre will seat over 450 people, it will be a beautiful Edwardian theatre but it will have all the conveniences expected of modern theatres, namely raked seating, air-conditioning, generous foyers, large stage space, rest rooms and recessed (hidden) lighting.

The restoration will occur contemporaneously with development on either side and over the theatre. These developments, a boutique hotel and small executive apartments will have associated cafes and restaurants which will greatly enhance the North Sydney area. The Trust will benefit from the sale of the air space, the acquisition of the southern wall, the restoration and extension of the facade and access to professional catering facilities.

The cost of the restoration is estimated in excess of \$6 million of which approximately \$2 million will be covered by the air space sale agreement. The remaining monies will be raised from the businesses in North Sydney and the North Shore community over the next three years.

### COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES

The Trust is primarily supported by earned income. The source of this income ranges from commercial orchestra contracts to hiring lighting rigs, curtains and staging.

#### 1. TRUST COSTUMES SHOPS

This division was sold to management during 1989, the sale involved 49% vendor finance. The new management maintained the staff and shops and appears set to continue the growth in this very popular service of costume hire and manufacture.

## 2. TRUST STAGING AND LIGHTING HIRE

Among the most significant events for 1989 was the relocation of this department from Potts Point to 18 Amelia Street, Waterloo. The dismantling, moving and reassembling of around twenty years of accumulated stock was a mammoth undertaking.

The initial effect of the relocation was a downturn in business, particularly "off the street" customers. However, through an extensive direct mail campaign and vigorous "word of mouth" promotion client awareness was quickly raised. At this time we are well settled in at Waterloo and are more accessable to our clients.

During 1989 the department was staffed by Manager, Wayne Kellett and Tradesman, Tony Rogers who have had six and fifteen years respectively of service with The Trust.

## ASSISTING THE ARTS

The Trust manages a series of unique services for the arts industry:

# 1. THE TRUST TAX DEDUCTIBILITY PROGRAMME

This service has enabled over 700 arts bodies to solicit donations from individuals and corporations by offering tax deductibility when the donations are processed through The Trust.

The size of donations processed in 1989 fell by 4% from the all time high in

1988, the Bicentennial Year. However, at \$6,330,990, this remains a significant part of arts funding.

The Trust charges a nominal levy to process these donations as sponsorship was deemed inappropriate and the Australia Council ceased the partial funding of this service in 1988.

This service has been upgraded to a faster turnaround of donations, a move much appreciated by the arts industry. This department is managed by Barbara Costen.

# 2. THE TRUST SUPERANNUATION FUNDS

The Trust superannuation fund is designed specifically for the needs of the arts industry. Its administration is sensitive to the somewhat itinerant nature of the artists and arts administrators. Whilst this scheme is open to people working in other industries it is being promoted primarily in the arts and entertainment sectors.

Currently the assets under management exceed \$11 million. This service is under constant review to ensure it reflects the latest changes in the superannuation guidelines.

This service is administered by The Trust with the AMP Society being responsible for the funds management.

## 3. THE TRUST PROMOTIONAL MARKETING SERVICE

Over 100 arts bodies in NSW benefit from this service which allows the arts industry to join in a membership body that negotiates low advertising rates directly from the media. This service is slowly being expanded to other States.

In 1989, The Trust Promotional Marketing Service saved the arts industry in excess of \$500,000 on a turnover of approximately \$3 million. This service is managed by Little and Associates on behalf of The Trust.

#### 4. HALFTIX

The Halftix booth in Martin Place, Sydney,

sells half-price tickets to students, pensioners and general theatre lovers. This division of The Trust significantly upgraded its image and services during 1989 primarily due to the sponsorship from the NSW Ministry for the Arts. This grant enabled us to redesign the booth and produce improved promotional material.

These improvements were partially responsible for the ABC radio station 2BL agreeing to actively promote Halftix.

The contribution of 2BL and the NSW Ministry for the Arts has resulted in the doubling of the number of tickets sold and events listed. This division is managed by Jose Calarco.

## 5. INTERNATIONAL THEATRE LIAISON

In 1989 the Trust continued to liaise with various Government departments and to host the International Theatre Institute (ITI). The ITI has since moved its offices from The Trust and is now located with Actors Equity.

The international liaison role of the Trust will continue into 1990.

## BENEFITTING MEMBERS

There were major advances in the membership services in 1989. These were as follows:

#### 1. ARTS CARD GOES NATIONAL

The Arts Card continued to be used for member identification. The card had to be renamed from The Arts Australia Card to the Arts Card when New Zealand joined this service in late 1989.

The New Zealand office is managed by the Michael Fowler Centre in Wellington. This relationship enables all our members to book shows in New Zealand and Australia.

The Arts Card in New Zealand is managed by Gillian Houser.

## 2. FLIGHT DECK – AFFILIATE MEMBERSHIP

In August, 1989 The Trust welcomed Australian Airlines' Flight Deck members into a sponsored affiliate membership with the Arts Card members. This meant that tens of thousands of Flight Deck members could access our international preferential booking service (but not our discounts or functions).

This arrangement had two benefits for our members; much improved purchasing power and an expanded service to include rock and roll and popular concerts and events.

The Trust also has access to airline tickets for its interstate staff and Board members.

#### 3. TRUST NEWS/FRONT ROW

The membership magazine, Trust News, has now been incorporated in tabloid format and renamed "Front Row". This move was caused by rising print prices and the desire to move towards a more youthful image for this publication.

## 4. MEMBERS OFFICES & CLUBROOMS

In 1989, new members' offices and clubrooms were created in Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. This upgrading of member and staff facilities was the result of the initiatives of the State boards in Victoria, Western Australia and South Australia (see below for highlights).

## DEVELOPING AUSTRALIAN TALENT

#### 1. AUSTRALIAN CONTENT DEPARTMENT

1989 was a quieter year for the Australian Content Department following the intense activity of the Bicentennial.

The first production was a visual theatre piece entitled, *Hello*, directed and designed by Kim Carpenter, a recent recipient of a Churchill Fellowship. Hello was a stream of images incorporating music, dance, acting and song with music by Dalmazo Barbare and choreography by Aku Kadoga. Presented in association with Kim's new company, Theatre of Image, Hello had a three week season at The Wharf Studio, Sydney.

Pipe-Dreaming. This was the ninth in a series of 10 Prediction Pieces from performance artist Lyndal Jones. Based on juxtapositions, that of two generations, two cultures and two art forms, theatre and dance and using the talents of visual artist Lindy Lee, three actors and the entire Danceworks company. Pipe-Dreaming was performed at the Come Out Festival in Adelaide followed by a Melbourne season.

Continuing a policy of touring small companies the department brought 2 Dance Plus, a Dance-in-Education company from Western Australia to prform in outer metropolitan schools, followed by a showcase at the Sydney Company studio. Assistance was received from the Western Australian Department for the arts.

Lipstick Dreams, written by Simon Hopkinson and Helen O'Connor, is a humourous look at the lives of four women in a country hairdressing salon. This play had been written for the New England Theatre Company and toured as part of the NSW Bicentennial programme. The production was remounted starring Lorraine Bayly and played most successfully for three weeks at Newcastle followed by a further three weeks at the Belvoir Street Theatre, Sydney.

In support of multicultural work a tour by the South Australian Italian company *Doppio Teatro* was undertaken, presenting Ricordi in Canberra, Wollongong, Sydney and Melbourne with performances in schools, clubs and at The Wharf Studio during Carnivale. Doppio Teatro had never performed outside their own city and on the strength of this tour have been offered an invitation to a festival in Leeds and a tour to Italy.

The final production of the year was a presentation of two new Australian operas by the Sydney Metropolitan Opera Company and composed by Andrew Schults and Raffello Marchellino. The two operas, *The Remedy* and *Black River*, under the title of Under Threat, were directed by John Wregg and conducted by Roland Peelman using the Seymour Group as orchestra and leading Australian opera singers, including John Pringle. The exercise was highly successful and the department has been asked to produce further modern compositions in the future.

The Arts Administration Training Scheme was initiated by the Australian Content Department in collaboration with the Seaborn Broughton and Walford Foundation. The successful candidates, Jonathan Parsons and Robina Burton worked with the Australian Content Department and the Theatre of the Deaf until April, 1990.

The Australian Content Department received a joint grant from the Performing Arts Board of the Australia Council and the Department of Foreign Affairs in Canberra towards participation and travel costs for Lyndal Jones and Lindy Davies to attend the first Commonwealth Theatre Laboratory (16 June to 1 July) in Bhopal, India. The focus of the laboratory was Working With Tradition Towards A Modern Theatre.

Grants from the Australia Council and the NSW Ministry for the Arts were administered to collect, collate, catalogue and prepare for storage all artistic and archival material of the Marionette Theatre of Australia. The Australian Content Department received financial assistance in 1989 from the Performing Arts Board of the Australia Council, the Federal Government's arts funding and advisory body, the NSW Ministry for the Arts, the Western Australian Department for the Arts. The department gratefully acknowledges assistance from BP Australia, Showtravel Tours, Qantas Airways Ltd, Triumph-Adler and the Holden Motor Company.

This department is managed by Wendy Blacklock.

# 2. ELIZABETHAN PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA

Operational

The Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra (EPO) provided services to The Australian Opera for 167 performances and 115 rehearsals and to The Australian Ballet for 84 performances and 27 rehearsals.

Two public concerts were presented, conducted by the Musical Adviser, John Grundy.

Transfer

This orchestra was transferred to a new organisation named the Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra (AOBO) on 31 December, 1989. AOBA is run by a board nominated by The Australian Opera, The Australian Ballet and the AOBO players themselves.

The transfer marked an end of the Trust's formal links with subsidised orchestras and the Board and staff wish this new body well for its future.

Prior to transfer, The Trust, in association with the Victorian Arts Centre, successfully negotiated with the Musicians Union of Australia a complete restructuring of the Opera and Ballet Award and the Industrial Relations Commission granted the first stage of a wage increase to the musicians.



#### 3. ELIZABETHAN SINFONIETTA

During 1989 the Elizabethan Sinfonietta performed a variety of activities including the recording for the Australian Ballet of the ballet "Snugglepot and Cuddlepie".

Other involvements included a concert at Sutherland Civic Centre, an "Evening of Mozart" at the Hotel Inter-Continental and a tour to Tokyo for performances of "Aida" by the International Opera Festival. The orchestra, enlarged to 87 players for its tour, performed to over 200,000 people at the Tokyo Dome. The performances were warmly received by promotors and audience.

All performances of the Sinfonietta were financially and artistically profitable. A high standard of excellence has been achieved by all members of the Sinfonietta under the management of Warwick Ross.

#### 4. THE THEATRE OF THE DEAF

In its tenth anniversary year, Theatre of the Deaf appointed its first deaf Artistic Director, Carol-Lee Aquiline, who with Administrator, Rosalind Richards, enabled the company to strike out firmly and confidently along its new artistic path of providing quality theatre that is visually exciting and innovative.

1989 was dedicated to consolidating this style of performance with skills development for the actors and a growth in the willingness to experiment with style to find a union between deaf visuality and hearing theatre demands.

The 1989 Summer School was structured as a three day intensive workshop due to the fact that the deaf participants were, on average, younger than anticipated (between 12 to 15 years old).

The company of four actors, Wayne Borg, Mike Canfield, Sofya Gollan and Kimberley Pickering developed a strong ensemble feel in their work. Productions included the popular Behind The Window which toured Queensland from Brisbane to Rockhampton

with the assistance of the Queensland Arts Council with 33 performances and 8 workshops and the Victorian Association of Performing Arts Centres circuit with 34 performances and 11 workshops. The time in Victoria ended with a week's residency in Geelong. Financial support for the Victorian tour was provided by the ANZ trustees.

The company's new production for young people was Jumping Off The Shelf, which was co-directed by Carol-Lee Aquiline and the company's ex-Artistic Director, Patrick Mitchell. Jumping Off The Shelf proved to be very popular with schools and children with 88 performances. Tours of Jumping Off The Shelf included Victorian and NSW schools and the production continues into 1990.

The company's in-theatre production for 1989, Wolfmoon, was a critical and audience success, with a three week season at The Wharf Studio. Wolfmoon was a collaboration between hearing and deaf co-directors, Margaret Davis and Carol-Lee Aquiline. This collaboration served to carry the company towards its goal of finding a unique style of totally visual theatre that can be equally enjoyed by both deaf and hearing audiences alike. Future plans to tour Wolfmoon are underway, including plans to take it to Melbourne's Next Wave Festival in 1990 and to Adelaide's Come Out in 1991.

Internationally, the company's Artistic Director, Carol-Lee Aquiline, was invited to address the inaugural Deaf Way Festival in Washington DC USA. Caol-Lee's return air ticket was generously provided by Qantas.

Skills development continued throughout the year. These were made possible by special grants from the Performing Arts Board of the Australia Council.

In 1989, the company increased corporate sponsorship by over 300% on the previous year and regained the respect of the deaf community, particularly in NSW. Audiences were developed both within NSW and throughout the nation, with the company performing to over 27,000 people. Also in 1989, His Excellency, the Honourable Bill Havden AC, Governor-General of the

Commonwealth of Australia, accepted the Theatre of the Deaf's invitation to become its Patron.

Theatre of the Deaf received support in 1989 from the Performing Arts Board of the Australia Council (the Federal Government's arts funding and advisory body), the NSW Ministry for the Arts, the ANZ Trustees, Esso, Unilever, QANTAS, The Trust's Sydney Committee and the Queensland Trust Committee.

This department is administered by Rosalind Richards.

# **DIRECTORS REPORT 1989**

# **DIRECTORS & RESPONSIBILITIES**

1. A Director must be a member of the Company.

2. The Company is limited by Guarantee and accordingly does not issue shares.

3. Contracts are entered into in the normal course of business by the company with companies of which some Directors are common to both. Since the end of the previous year no Director has received or become entitled to receive a benefit by reason of a contract made by the company with the Director or with a firm of which he is a member or with a company in which he has a substantial interest.

4. The principal activities of the company during the financial year were the administration of the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra; the presentation promotion and assistance of drama, music and dance throughout Australia; making and hiring of costumes and other theatrical equipment. There has not been any significant changes in the nature of these activities during the financial year, other than those detailed in this Report.

5. The years activities resulted in an operating consolidated loss of

\$1,029,006. The Company is exempt from income tax.

6. The Company's Memorandum of Association prohibits the distribution of income and property by way of dividend or bonus and no dividend or bonus has been paid or declared since the end of the previous financial year.

7. A review of the operations of the company during the financial year and the result of those operations is contained in the Chairman's Report and the CEO's Review on pages 3 to 8 of this Annual Report.

8. In the opinion of the Directors there was no significant change in the state of affairs of the company during the year not otherwise disclosed

in this Report or the Accounts.

9. There are no matters or circumstances that have arisen since the end of the financial year other than those referred to in the accounts, the notes thereto and this Annual Report that have significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the company, the results of these operations or the state of affairs of the company in the financial year subsequent to that financial year.

10.In the opinion of the Directors disclosure of information regarding likely development in the operations of the company or its subsidiary and the expected results of those operations would prejudice the interests of the company. Accordingly this information has not been included in this Report.



## NOTES TO & FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 1989

#### 1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING METHODS

#### (a) Accounting

The accounts for the company and its subsidiary have been prepared under the historical cost convention modified by the revaluation of freehold land and bulidings, musical instruments, costumes and electrical equipment.

Divisional Profit and Loss Accounts have been prepared in respect of the General Activities of the company and its subsidiary and the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra. These have been amalgamated to give total Income and Expenditure after the elimination of inter company income and charges. The Australia Council, as one of its conditions of subsidy for the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra, required the balance of any profit or loss arising from the annual activities of the orchestral division to be disclosed as a seperate definable item (see Profit & Loss Account) (see note 14).

(b) The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of The Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust and its subsidiary, Roncord Pty Ltd. All inter-company accounts and transactions have been eliminated. There is no comparative consolidated values for 1988 as the Company became a subsidiary on 31st December 1989 (see note 2).

#### (c) Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles including the going concern principle. The ability of the holding company to maintain its operations is dependant on the normal business activities deriving sufficient future income and continuing support of various governments by subsidies.

#### (d) Depreciation

Leasehold improvements have been amortised over the period of the lease. Other plant and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful life using the straight line method of depreciation (see Note 6).

#### (e) Stock on Hand (Inventories)

Stock on Hand consists of consumable stores and supplies and has been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value with cost being the main basis. Cost has been determined by the first in first out method. (see note 4)

#### (f) Funds for Specific and Special Purposes

#### (i) Special Purposes

The company has entered into a number of agreements with the Australia Council to administer certain grants either on its behalf or at its direction. A condition in each agreement is that the amount of the grant and its expenditure is to appear in the annual financial accounts of the company. In addition, certain deposits, grants and theatre ticket sales are administered on behalf of other organisations. Special Purpose Funds have not been brought into account in determining the net result of the company (refer Note 10).

#### (ii) Specific Subsidies

Expenditure for Specific Subsidies together with sufficient income to meet that expenditure has been included in the Profit and Loss Account. The balance of these grants has not been included in determining the net result of the company (refer Note 10).

#### (q) Subsidies

Subsidies are received from the Australia Council which cover a period that corresponds with the company's financial year, and other State Governments and City Councils which cover a period that does not correspond with the company's financial year.

Income from subsidies is brought into account on a time basis over the period of the subsidies notwithstanding that the level of activity being funded may vary from one period to the next.

#### (h) Donations Received

Donations received for the support of activities carried out in the financial period are included as income in the Profit and Loss Account whereas donations received in support of future activities are deferred until such time as expended.

#### (i) Productions in Progress

Where the company has theatrical productions in progress, the practise is for the running costs for the tour of each activity to be accumulated and reduced by box office income until completion, at which time the result is determined and the company's share brought to account. All costs are carried forward at balance date on the basis that it is reasonably expected that future revenue sufficient to absorb the cost carried forward will be derived.

#### (i) Provision for Sick Leave

Members of the Elizabethan Philharmonic Orchestra are entitled to accumulate a limited number of sick leave days. To meet possible contingencies, a provision for each member has been provided in the accounts.

#### (k) Membership fees

Membership fees are brought to account on a cash received basis.

#### (1) Leases

The company has adopted the following accounting policies for leases:

- (i) Operating leases minimum lease payments are charged to expense in equal instalments over the accounting periods covered by the lease term.
- (ii) Finance leases an initial asset and liability equal in amount to the present value of the lease term. The discount rate used in determining the present value is the (estimated) interest rate implicit in the lease. The lease asset is amortised against the income of the accounting periods which are expected to benefit from its use. Minimum lease payments are allocated between interest expense and reduction of the lease liability. The interest expense is determined by applying the interest rate implicit in the lease to the outstanding lease liability at the beginning of each lease payment period.

#### 14 SPECIFIC RESERVE

As noted in |(a) and as a condition of grant from the Australia Council the net result arising from the operations of the orchestral division have been separately disclosed in the orchestral reserve. The Elizabethan Philarmonic was transferred to new management effective 31st December 1989. The orchestra reserve has now been transferred at that date to a Specific Reserve as the Directors acknowledge the amount will be used for future orchestral purposes.

#### 15 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent to the year end, the Council of the Municipality of North Sydney has approved a rezoning of the theatre owned by the subsidiary company, Roncord Pty Ltd, which will allow development of the air space above the theatre with the adjoining site as a hotel. Approval of the N.S.W. Ministry of Planning & Environment is, at the date of this report, being sought. No objection is anticipated from the Ministry.

Conditional contracts for the sale of the theatre's air space have been exchanged with a total consideration of \$1,700,000 (subject to the level of the approval of the development). At balance date the air space at Director's Valuation of \$1,186,415 has been brought to account (see notes 6 & 11).

#### 16 SEGMENT REPORTING

The group operates predominately in Australia in the performing arts and entertainment industry.

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
