


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

The quality of "mate-ship" and the war of conflicting loyalties which is the basis of the play lend themselves to tense drama which, relieved by a sharp humour, is the essence of good theatre. An unusual milieu lends an intriguing quality to the play's background, and we wish you a pleasant evening as this new work unfolds before you.

Next in our programme is the Trust's first Australian Musical-LOLA MONTEZ-an exciting and amusing story of the gold rush days in Ballarat and a certain tempestuous lady whose visit caused as great a sensation as a lucky strike.

KEN WAYNE



RU PULLAN

Pullan, Melbourne - born Ru author of "Curly on the Rack", began his writing career as a freelance scriptwriter in 1938.

In 1942 he joined the staff of 3AW, for whom he wrote original plays and adaptations. He wrote a serial for children entitled "Tim the Toyman", which was first heard over 3UZ and which has been repeated many times over various networks. While working with the Donovan Joyce Production Unit he wrote numerous original radio plays, including "The Devil's Duchess", "Convict Girl" and "The Impostor", which have been heard on radio networks throughout Australia and New Zealand.

He has written several radio serials, best known being "Jane Armitage". In addition to this, he has written a play which has been presented by the B.B.C. TV, entitled "The Big Vine".

NIGEL LOVELL

Nigel Lovell studied drama at the University Dramatic Society under the direction of May Hollingworth. He began in radio in 1938 and has worked in this medium almost continuously since that time. In recent years he has been working on the production side of radio. His stage performances at the Minerva

Theatre include Kit in "French Without Tears" and the leading role in "Mr. Smart Guy".

He appeared in the films "Eureka Stockade" and "Wherever She Goes".

In 1951 he won a British Council Scholarship to study production in England, where he stayed for a year gaining experience at Stratford-on-Avon. The Old Vic. Theatre (London and Bristol), Covent Garden and Glyndebourne.

In 1954 he came to Sydney, where he joined the staff of the Macquarie Broad-

casting Corporation, and since this time he has been concerned with writing adaptations for such well-known plays as "The Magnificent Obsession", "The Third Man"

These appearances were followed by a twelve months' season at the Comedy Theatre, Melbourne. Has made numerous Shakespearean appearances, notably with the original John Alden Company, playing leading roles in "The Merchant of Venice", "Measure for Measure", "King Lear".

Films include "The Power and the Glory" with Peter Finch (1940), and "The Phantom Stockman" for Chips Rafferty.

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

Began in amateur theatricals before the war and shortly afterwards started out in the professional field with three I. C. Williamson's productions, "Arsenic and Old Lace", "The Man Who Came to Dinner" and "Kiss and Tell". Played several seasons at the Minerva Theatre and after appearing in "Eureka Stockade" he moved to Melbourne and continued acting in radio and appeared in several stage productions, best known of which was "Dark of the Moon" at the Comedy with Michael Pate and Rosemary Miller.

In 1953 he went to England and there gradually made his way in B.B.C. TV and radio. He was chosen for two important roles in London's West End, the Orson Welles' production of "Moby Dick" and the "Devil's Disciple" for H. M. Tennant, starring Tyrone Power. Later he appeared in the film "Seven Waves Away" with Tyrone Power and Lloyd Nolan. Since his return to Australia he has played in several productions for J. C. Williamson's, The Independent Theatre and The Australian Élizabethan Theatre Trust, including "The Happiest Days of Your Life" and "Time Remembered", starring English actress Margaret Rutherford.

He also appeared at the Independent Theatre in "Naked Possum", "The Prisoner" and "Waters of the Moon". He has worked in radio for many years

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
