Shows have been coming thick and fast during the past six months and we suspect that a word or two about the Trust Member Preferential Booking system wouldn't go amiss. First of all what does it mean? It means quite simply that before the show is advertised to the public you as a Trust Member have first pick of the seats. This is a considerable advantage and we make every effort to see that you get this advance booking period for all shows. Unfortunately it isn't always possible. If it's a Trust presented show then it's easy. We know well in advance that the show is coming and can give you plenty of warning. But we are able to offer you concessions for shows presented by a whole range of managements — Michael Edgley, J.C. Williamson, Paul Dainty and so forth. And in these cases we rely on the managements to let us know what shows are coming up. Sometimes they aren't as fast off the mark as we'd like or sometimes the shows are last minute presentations. In any event you don't always get a preferential booking period. It isn't ideal and for this we're sorry (DOCTOR IN LOVE is a case in point – see above). All we can do is make it quite clear whether you have preferential bookings or not and if you don't see that you get the best seats available at the time of booking. AND REMEMBER if over counter bookings have opened (see local press) you can always go directly to the theatre, show your membership card and book in person at Trust Member prices. That way you can see just what is available.

THE MARIONETTE THEATRE OF AUSTRALIA

The Marionette Theatre of Australia was formed in 1965 to provide Australia with a full-time professional puppet company following the great success of Peter Scriven's productions of THE TINTOOKIES, LITTLE FELLA BINDI and THE MAGIC PUDDING. The company was established as a national touring company based in Sydney and has already made three tours of South-East Asia. Its first productions were revivals of THE TINTOOKIES and LITTLE FELLA BINDI followed by a new Peter Scriven production THE EXPLORERS.

The style of these shows is that for which Peter Scriven and the Marionette Theatre of Australia is best known. The puppeteers stand above the puppet stage on a concealed 'bridge' and the puppets are worked by long strings from wooden 'controls'. The scale of the puppets and puppet-stage made it possible for the shows to play successfully to large



audiences. It was a combination of this particular style of production and its role as a touring company which made the Marionette Theatre unique in the western world.

A similar style was used for THE WATER BABIES, directed by English puppetmaster Jan Bussell, TALES FROM NOONAMEENA and Peter Scriven's revised production of THE TINTOOKIES in 1975. However, the company has at times used different kinds of puppets. TINTOOKIES 2000 used rod-puppets and a black theatre technique was used for PETER AND THE WOLF. More recently THE WACKY WORLD OF WORDS used an open stage technique with a variety of puppet styles and spoken instead of recorded sound.

During the past year the Marionette Theatre has moved in a new direction under the guidance of artistic director Richard Bradshaw who is well known both here and overseas as a shadow puppeteer.

In the company's current shows Richard Bradshaw used two different techniques. ROOS uses a style influenced by the Bunraku of Japan and HANDS uses curtain-of-light black theatre.

The new artistic director is interested in exploring a variety of puppet forms and developing the idea of actor-puppeteers. He also wishes to explore the possibilities in mixing puppetry with other art forms such as drama, mime and dance.

While the company will continue performing for children it aims to increase its adult following to the point where it can present shows especially for adult audiences.

ALL AUSTRALIAN PROGRAMME IN DANCE COMPANY'S NEW SEASON

One of the two programmes being presented in the Dance Company (N.S.W.)'s second 1977 Opera House season will have all Australian choreography, music and design. It represents the fulfilment of a plan conceived by Artistic Director Graeme Murphy when he took over as Director late in 1976 and has brought together the most talented Australians available. The programme consists of three world premieres: Christine Koltai's REACH, a new work by Ian Spink and a new work by Graeme Murphy to a specially commissioned score by Carl Vine. The second programme playing on alternate nights with the first offers a long awaited revival of John Butler's modern masterpiece CARMINA BUR-ANA as well as Jaap Fliers HI-KYO, Graeme Murphy's 3RD CONVERSA-TION and MEDIEVAL MALICS a new work by acclaimed young dancer/ choreographer Graeme Watson.

SYDNEY INTERNATIONAL PIANO COMPETITION 1977

Forty young musicians with ages ranging from 19 to 31 and representing the cream of world talent will compete before a distinguished jury drawn from Europe, Asia, Australia and America. The pianists will play through four stages: solo piano recitals of both the traditional and contemporary repertoire; lieder accompaniment to the distinguished Australian mezzo soprano Helen Mc Kinnon; piano quintet (with the Sydney String Quartet); a Mozart concerto; and one of the great Romantic works of Chopin, Beethoven, Brahms, Rachmaninov or Tchaikovsky.
