OVER COUNTER BOOKINGS

Judging by the queries received in the membership office there is some confusion amongst our Members over the availability of Trust Member concessions at the theatre box office. We should therefore explain that concessions offered in Trust News can be obtained at the theatre box office or Mitchells-Bass agencies (at Grace Brothers stores) on production of your membership card. There is the occasional exception to this rule (e.g. bookings for The Australian Ballet) but these exceptions are always made clear in Trust News.

The disadvantage of buying tickets directly from the box office is that you are competing for tickets with the general public and normally cannot buy tickets more than 12 days in advance (at some theatres only 6 days in advance). This is why your Trust Member booking coupons are so valuable. They enable you to book immediately you receive Trust News for any performance of the season and usually these booking facilities are available before booking opens to the general public. You therefore have access to the best seats.

We therefore recommend that if you are booking well in advance you use your Trust Member booking coupons but if you wish to book for a show only a few days ahead you should contact the theatre or agencies directly to obtain your tickets.


HUMAN VEINS DANCE COMPANY

Human Veins, Australia's newest professional modern dance group was formed late in 1979 by Don Asker, an experienced choreographer who left a flourishing career in Europe to return to his homeland.
