


# DIRUST IFW

Although the company performs works by other choreographers it is Ailey's own works which give the company its unique soul and style. Ailey's work alone provides the repertoire with a great diversity for his choreography has gone through almost as many phases or periods as Picasso's



#### IN THE BELLY OF THE BEAST

Highlight of this year's theatre programme is the Centre Theatre Group from the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles which will play at the Everest Theatre, Seymour Centre. They will present IN THE BELLY OF THE BEAST. based on the book length collection of letters by Jack Henry Abbott, adapted for the stage by Adrian Hall and further adapted and directed by Adrian Woodruff.

The play is the story of a man who for all his adult life has only spent nine months out of prison - a man with no formal education, who learned it all in prison. Jack Abbott learned dialectics, science. philosophy and mathematical logic. But he also learned how to live by violence. He is the victim of a penal system that taught how to live like an animal but taught

nothing about living free. Abbott began writing to journalist/author Norman Mailer after seeing a newspaper article about Mailer's book on convicted murderer Gary Gilmore. Through Mailer's offices, several of these letters on the violence and anguish of prison life were published. Abbott would have remained just another faceless prison inmate if Norman Mailer hadn't taken up the convicts cause and found a publisher for the collection of letters about prison life. In essence, the play sends viewers on a jarring and unforgettable trip into the nightmarish world of the prison. It is a disturing look at the prison system and the brutalisation of its in-mates both within and without the prison walls. It is an examination of the nature and definition of freedom.



50 talented high school students from all over NSW will take part in the Australian Theatre for Young People's Sydney Festival attraction. Specially commissioned from leading Australian playwright David Allen, the production is set in May 1942 and is entitled THE NIGHT WE BLITZED THE BRIDGE. It is suitable for primary and secondary school

The show is ideal for holiday audiences as it is full of excitement and suspense as well as music and dancing. A group of young people have organised a dance aboard a ferry to raise money for the war effort but while they are jitterbugging and enjoying the festivities, three Japanese submarines have slipped into Sydney Harbour. Suddenly the night erupts into an inferno of shellfire and depth charges and undercover of the darkness one of the submarine's crew sneaks onto the ferry. THE NIGHT WE BLITZED THE BRIDGE is being assisted by the Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust and will play at the Parade Theatre. It will be directed by Simon Hopkinson, a freelance director who has been associated with the Melbourne Theatre Company and the Darwin Theatre Group in recent times and has always had a particular interest in children's theatre.
