The Quiet Achiever

The Trust's Australian Content Department has long had a commitment to Aboriginal theatre through the work of Western Australian Jack Davis. Since 1984 several plays for both adults and children have been commissioned and toured extensively in

Australia and overseas.

During the Bicentennial year it was imperative that Jack Davis' work was given a national focus to counterbalance white Australia's birthday party celebrations.

The Australian Content Department therefore commissioned a further play, Barungin (Smell the Wind) which brought the history of the Wallitch family up to the present time — a family inhabiting a limbo world of prison deaths and forgotten or broken promises.

To present Barungin, The

Marli Biyol Company (Swan Playwright Jack Diver) was formed, with Jack as Artistic Director and Lynette Narkle, John Moore and Kelton Pell playing the main roles.

The Western Australian Theatre Company continued its policy of supporting the Marli Biyol and presented the world premiere during the Perth Festival.


Then the Adelaide Festival and Alice Springs followed and the company settled in Melbourne to rehearse, under Andrew Ross's direction, the trilogy of Jack's plays entitled The First Born. This could never have been presented without the enormous assistance given by the Melbourne Theatre Company at the unusual venue of the Fitzroy Town

The first play of the trilogy is *No Sugar* which is based on the removal of 81 Aborigines from their home in Northam to the Moore River Settlement. Set in the Depression years it is directed in a semipromenade production with the audience following the actors and the action.

No Sugar, because of its unusual staging and true story, was the play chosen to be the first Aboriginal theatre seen in London. The Marli Biyol Company was invited to the Riverside Studios in Hammersmith where critics were unanimous in

their praise, describing it as a brilliant and sophisticated portrait of Aboriginal life ... unfortunately the season couldn't be extended as the Marli Biyol was booked to return to Brisbane to perform Barungin at Expo and on to the South Pacific Festival in Townsville.

At the conclusion of this season, the company, which expanded to 22 for some plays, had acted in 90 performances, had been seen by 26,000 people and been employed for eight months.

FESTIVALS HERE, FESTIVALS THERE

There can be few towns and even fewer cities in recent years that have not succumbed to the universal urge to celebrate the arts en masse. Festivals are the cultural pandemic of the 80's. Many world renowned fests, such as Edinburgh and Adelaide, do a blanket job giving space and time to every art performed in the known world. Others devote themselves entirely to esoterica such as puppetry or the musical gumbo of Creole jazz. Still greater numbers of festivals are truly amateur and parochial but no less fun for that. But it is the sheer volume and frequency of performance that would seem to guarantee to drain the reservoir of talent and that the last quality one could expect to find is quality itself. Oddly, and thankfully, that is not the case. Two festivals planned for Sydney and Perth are testimony to the skill of their organisers in encouraging some of the world's finest talents to perform in Australia.

THE FESTIVAL OF PERTH February and March 1989

Artists from Russia, Korea, Poland, England, America, Italy, Spain, West Germany, Canada and France have been invited to perform in a wide ranging pastiche of opera, theatre, cabaret, dance and music at the 1989 Festival of Perth.

Trust members, as holders of the new Arts Australia Card, can contact their Trust office for the Visitor's Gift Pass which entitles them to discounts for all attractions listed in the Festival brochure and free entry to the Festival Club.

Special 7 night/8 day packages have been arranged on a share twin basis which includes economy air fare and accommodation at the 5-star Burswood Hotel. Ex Sydney price is \$1089 per person with slightly differing costs for other eastern city departures. Packages flying business and first class are also available. Reservations can be made at the Western Australia Tourist Centre in your capital city.

It is difficult to single out one event for special mention but Peter Brook's 'The Tragedy of Carmen' is the most likely candidate for critical honours.

In his production Brook avoids cut-and-tried operatic conventions so as to heighten the communication between performer and audience and strips off the veil of respectability in which Carmen has been cloaked by 19th century theatrical tradition. She appears as Merimee intended, a coarse vet seductive prostitute and thief. To heighten this earthy image Brook has transformed the stage into a rough bullring carpeted with earth into which Carmen tosses the tarot cards which spell her fate and that of her soldier lover. Don Jose.

Carmen promises dramatic, sensual entertainment. If you go to Perth don't leave for home without seeing it.

THE FESTIVAL OF SYDNEY January 1989

The Festival of Sydney, like its Western Australian counterpart,

has dipped its finger into most of the performing pies, but it has spread its programme wider to include a host of events involving community participation. Merlin's Festival Treasure Hunt is a whacky search for elusive clues throughout the Sydney CBD which anyone can join, the harbour race by six grand old ferries and street theatre in Macquarie Street and Darling Harbour, to focus on just three. Spectator spectaculars include an old time schooner race from Farm Cove to Watsons Bay, the N.R.M.A. Motorfest, a gathering of over 500 old vehicles and the Massed Bands Tattoo plus plenty of free opera, jazz and concert music under the stars at the Domain.

Choosing a highlight is no less difficult for Sydney but if bizarre originality with a healthy dash of genius is the yardstick then 'La La La Human Steps' would get the guernsey, if only for their name alone.

'L.L.H.S.' hails from Montreal and was breathed into life by Edouard Lock, avante-garde choreographer extraordinaire. In its eighth year the company of four have danced, kicked, screamed and flown with unbridled energy throughout Europe and North America.

Critics have been genuinely lavish in their praise in a medium not noted for its generosity. "The best seven minutes I have ever seen" said one describing a piece they performed in London with David Bowie.

Lock has turned contemporary dance on its ear casting aside accepted notions of what is even possible.

If dance is not your style you had better go and see it: you could change your mind.

On 19 February 1958 three talented Australians collaborated for the first time to write and produce a home grown musical at a time when the public were being fed with American and British shows. The show was 'Lola Montez' with music by Peter Stannard, lyrics by Peter Benjamin from the book by Alan Burke. The Melbourne Union Theatre Rep Company's production was a great success and heralded the new age of Australian theatre. As part of Canberra's Bicentenary celebrations the musical has been completely updated with new songs and orchestration and will be revived and directed by the author, Alan Burke. Australian Dance Theatre and Carclew Youth Performing Arts Centre have been joined by the Magpie Theatre Company and will present Dance/Drama Summercourses in Adelaide from January 12 to 21, 1989.

Previous Dance Summercourse collaborations between Australian Dance Theatre and Carclew have been extremely successful. The courses feature some of Adelaide's most experienced dancers and educators.



And with the benefit of hindsight DON'S PARTY is more than a satirical look at the permissive society of the late 60's. Power and how it works, from the kitchen to the Parliament, is Williamson's pervading theme and in DON'S PARTY Williamson dramatises the collision between ambition, power and the absurdities of its realisation with the catalyst an election broadcast.

They Shall Have Music

Australian Orchestral Enterprises is a new Trust division formed to keep professional musicians playing regularly and playing well. Trust News Manager Christine Wright finally pinned the energetic A.O.E. head, Warwick Ross, to his desk to discover the background to this new venture and his plans for its future.

Christine: As Administrator of The Elizabethan Philharmonic it was your role to staff the orchestra. Tell us how your experience there led to the founding of Australian Orchestral Enterprises.

Warwick: There were times when we needed to enlarge the Philharmonic by engaging casual musicians. Sometimes there was an excess of talent to choose from but most times there was a dearth of the particular instruments we needed and within each instrumental group playing standards which varied from fine to inexperienced. It seemed clear that to consolidate the availability of extra players to meet the needs of the Philharmonic, mostly during the Australian Opera's winter season, we had to try and provide them the remaining six or so months when they might well trot off to seek work interstate or overseas. If we could do that it was in the interests of both the players and the orchestra.

Not only would they be on hand when called but their experience would grow.

Christine: When did you first conceive this concept?

Warwick: Almost as soon as I joined the Philharmonic in '86. I had been booking orchestras for Edgleys on a freelance basis since 1979 when I came back from England and I had the same problem. I often had to import players from other states, and that's a costly business. In addition to basic wages one has to add travel and freight costs and a living away



with employment in Sydney during Warwick Ross who conceived and founded Australian Orchestral Enterprises.

allowance. This can add up to \$2000 a season over the cost of employing a local musician.

Christine: Did you ever have to tell an overseas producer that he couldn't stage his show because of a lack of musicians?

Warwick: Yes, and I still think it happens. The Royal Ballet was a case in point. We had trouble finding a good oboe & harp section. We got around it by combining parts and bringing in a harpist from Adelaide at the 11th hour. It seemed obvious to me that everyone would be better off if we could have a harpist of suitable quality available when

required and when not needed by us that they would have employment in Sydney for the rest of the year. I am not suggesting that we manage their careers but we do have the power to create work.

Christine: Hence the Elizabethan Sinfonietta.

Warwick: That's right. The Sinfonietta is a small orchestra that is brought together to meet the needs which cannot be provided by the S.S.O., The Philharmonic or The Australian Chamber Orchestra.

Christine: How do young musicians get the experience you are looking for?

Warwick: These days it is not so difficult if one is dedicated. In the 50's it was almost de riguer for a budding professional to take a boat to England and never be seen again for years whilst experience was built up listening to the great orchestras and, hopefully, getting a job. Even if one did not play one would get a fantastic insight just by being there. Now that has all changed. Quick flights to Europe, visits by the world's leading orchestras, television concerts and an influx of fine musicians into Australia to live and teach and play has increased our professionalism dramatically. We now have young players leaving conservatoria at international standards but they still lack the opportunity to gain experience in an orchestral environment in this country before applying for positions with such as the Melbourne or Sydney Symphony. I hope and believe we can do this through Australian Orchestral Enterprises.

Christine: Will you confine your activities to Sydney?

Warwick: By no means. We are certainly starting off here because the venture is bound to the Trust and we want to keep in day-to-day touch whilst it is weaned, but this is a national movement which we intend to develop not only in capital cities but through the countryside as well. It is important to note as well that we have no intention of usurping or damaging existing activities which pursue the same or similar aims as us but rather that we are a supplement.

Christine: I have heard you say that stability is an aid to quality. Can you explain that?

Warwick: By nature musicians are insular, particularly those at the top of the profession. From the age of five they have had to spend many hours each day in practice whilst their pals are out at the surf. They don't need to work with anyone else, except a few hours with their teacher, to improve technique so that after 10 years loneliness becomes a way of life. When it is time to marry they tend to marry within the musical circle. Constant travelling and anti-social hours tend to put pressure on relationships and so if we can

offer them some stability in terms of regular income and returning home as often as possible they will almost certainly become more relaxed and content and their overall quality as musicians will be higher. Constant touring is a feature of musical life in Europe and the States and it is becoming increasingly common here.

Christine: How do you intend to keep them employed?

Warwick: We have wide ranging plans but I think the most farreaching is to take quality music on a regular basis to communities which rarely if ever have the opportunity to hear such music unless they visit the Opera House or The Town Hall. The large audiences which throng those venues enjoy the somewhat formal atmosphere, dressing up for the occasion and driving into the city, but there are many, many more, who, in our typical Australian style would like to hear great music but in a more laid back style: the free concerts in the Domain are ample proof of that. We intend to take quality music to the suburbs and country towns and entertain community in an informal way to encourage those to attend a concert who may not have ever felt comfortable in doing so before. There is no question of condescension, of talking down to the audience, just simply providing them with alternative source of quality

Christine: What programmes have you set?

Warwick: Our programming is confidential at this stage but I can tell you that in the case of the Sinfonietta we will have a continuous tours of subscription concerts around the suburbs. Each concert will have a central theme, let's say one might focus on comedy. The idea is that the evening will be fun, something to laugh at yet at the same time superb music that everyone will enjoy and appreciate. Right now we are looking at venues and availability dates.

Christine: When do you plan to start?

Warwick: If we get our funding organised by January we plan to kick off in March. It would be

good to have a two weeks on, two weeks off schedule but obviously this will be interrupted by the need to enlarge the Philharmonic which, after all, was the reason this concept was developed in the first place. Our plan is for the Sinfonietta to initially have a strength of around 60 players and in time, say a year to double that number and have two orchestras simultaneously without a loss of quality. We are also interested in commercial, advertising and marketing engagements where the current availability of orchestras is almost nil.

Educational activities and audience development is another field which excites us immensely. Whatever we do we intend that it be scheduled to compliment other musical organisations so that together we enhance the musical life of the nation.
