

As indicated in the article Mr Jim Weeks has taken over the role of the Trust's financial controller and administrator on a part time basis with the permission of the Scheme Administrator Mr John Lord. The new arrangement is working well and with economy for the Trust, but ensuring sound accounting oversight daily. Chalwin Estate

In relation to the Chalwin Bequest, no money was or is receivable by the Trust from or under the will of the late Vivian Chalwin

However at the time of withdrawal of the appeal the next of kin made sizeable gifts which, if the conditions attaching thereto are met, which is by no means certain. will come to the Trust to be used "for the sustenance of the arts music and culture". Gifts in similar amounts for similar purposes were made at the same time to the University of Sydney., The entirety of the residue of the estate passed (as on an intestacy) to the next of kin; it did not pass to the Trust or the University of Sydney.

Board and Administration The Board of the Trust is reconstituted as follows, with greater emphasis on NSW directors as most of our activities are and will in the forseeable future be centred in that States.

Like an old phoenix rising from the ashes. the Australian **Elizabethan** Theatre Trust is tottering to its feet following a Federal Court ruling on its

settlement scheme. AVA HUBBLE reports on

the Trust's return.

HE return of the Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust, which is now back in business, has surprised the arts world. Another sur-

prise has been confirmation of backstage rumours that its major creditor, the Commonwealth Bank, not only wrote off a Trust debt of \$3 million but made good the losses that several national and State companies suffered when the Trust went into provisional liquidation in March last year. The Trust was then the only

approved organisation that could accept tax-deductible donations for the arts and it was criticised for failing to pass on donations earmarked for other companies before its collapse. The secretary of the Commonwealth

Bank, Mr David Anderson, has told the Herald that, shortly after the Trust's collapse, the Federal Court ruled that the bank had a rightful claim to all funds held in the Trust's accounts at the bank. But Mr Anderson said the bank board later decided that, as a "solid amount" of money in one of the Trust's accounts had been donated by sponsors for the benefit of other arts groups, it would be unfair to deprive those companies of that money, even though the bank was legally entitled

Consequently "about six months ago" the bank sent cheques to the affected companies. "I think they were pleasantly surprised," he said. Mr Anderson confirmed that the Victorian Tapestry Workshop, headed by Dame Elizabeth Murdoch, received a

Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra donations were made "without strings". received a donation of \$35,000. The Australian Ballet's general manager, Mr Ian McRae, said his company

received a cheque for \$30,000 from the bank. A snokesman for the Australian Opera, who did not want to be named. said: "The bank made a donation of something more than \$50,000 - equivalent to funds intended as donations for the Opera which were lost through

the collapse of the Trust." By why weren't those donations publicly acknowledged when they were received, particularly as there has been considerable public concern for companies which claimed they'd suffered badly because of the Trust's collarse? "I understood the bank didn't want us

to say anything," explained one spokes-man, who insisted he not be named. He suggested that the bank did not want it publicly known that it was replacing donations lost by arts groups at a time when other organisations, claiming to be creditors of the Trust, were being asked to accept seven cents in the dollar in lieu

of full settlement of their bills. Mr John Lord of the chartered accountants Duesburys, who acted as provisional liquidator of the Trust, told the Herald last week that he did know that the Commonwealth Bank had made donations as a result of the Trust's financial drama

During an interview last year, Mr Lord criticised arts groups which had accused the Trust of impropriety for failing to pass on sponsors' donations them before the collapse.

Mr Lord insisted then that up until the day it went into provisional liquidation the Trust was entitled to use any funds it held, including sponsors' funds, at its discretion. He said that while donors to the Trust were entitled to claim a tax rebate of 46 per cent, they cheque for about \$100,000 and that the could do so only on condition that their

He said that if a sponsor had asked the Trust to pass on its donation to a particular company, that sponsor could not claim a rebate

Consequently, he explained, arts companies which were insisting that the Trust had failed to pass on sponsors' donations intended for them were leaving those sponsors open to investigation by tax officers. Mr Lord repeated those claims when interviewed the Herald last week.

Performing companies, however, have always argued bitterly that whatever the strict letter of the law, the normal practice of the Trust was to pass on donations in accordance with sponsors' wishes.

"I think everyone was under the impression that that was what happened," agreed Mr Anderson of the Commonwealth Bank

But while arguments about points of law continue, the fact remains that some Trust creditors received only 7 per cent in lieu of full payment of claims.

The Sydney-based Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra, which until recently was part of the Trust organisation and was known as the Elizabethan Trust Sydney Orchestra, received only about \$32,000 of its claim for \$464,534. over and above the \$35,000 donation. A spokeswoman for the now-auton-

nous orchestra said that, as a result its sick leave and other reserves, as well as an instrument fund, had been "wiped out". But Mr Lord said that if creditors had refused to accept the seven cents in the dollar offered, "they would have got nothing", because the Trust would then have been forced into bankruptcy.

Following the Federal Court's recent approval of the settlement scheme offered to creditors2the Trust was able to resume the responsibility for its operations from Mr Lord. At a meeting

of directors last Thursday, long-serving Trust member, Mr Lloyd Waddy, QC was elected the new chairman. He replaces Mr James Strong, who recently left Australia to become chief executive of New Zealand Magnum Corporation

Mr Strong was formerly chairman of the solicitors Corrs Chambers Westgarth, which helped the Trust through its recent troubles by donating more than \$35,000 worth of legal services.

Mr Lord said the Sydney accountant Arthur Andersen donated about \$25,000 worth of services and that he and his staff had donated more than \$50,000 worth of services.

But what prompted these businessmen to put so much time into rescuing an organisation that, in the opinion of many arts people, deserved to go to the wall?

"I looked at what the Trust had done and what it might do in the future and thought it was worth saving," said Mr Lord. He said he was personally spurred on because he was "appalled' at the way the arts community turned on the Trust when it got into difficulties. "Companies that owe their existence to the Trust were the first to turn on it," he said. "[But] this wasn't a case of directors riding around in company cars and ripping people off." In fact, he said, Trust directors had made personal non-tax-deductible donations of \$10,000 to aid the rescue bid.

He dismissed as "Garbage!" arts industry claims that the directors' primary concern was to avoid the stigma of being associated with a bankrupt organisation.

The Trust began getting into deep water in the mid-1980s, when it lost about \$1 million staging the musical, Lennon. Subsequent productions of Sugar Babies and Las Vegas on Ice were also box office disasters.

The Trust's then administrative chief. Ms Kathleen Norris, took the brunt of the ensuing criticism

But in defence of Ms Norris and the board, Mr Lord points out that as entrepreneurs they had to take commercial risks. "We can all be wise after the event," he said

Mr Adam Salzer, who replaced Norris as the Trust chief officer in 1988, has also been criticised for initiatives that included a plan to buy the Independent theatre at North Sydney and raise money by selling the air space at the rear of the theatre to a developer for \$2.7 million.

But according to Mr Lord, Mr Salzer very nearly succeeded in rescuing the Trust with that project.

Mr Salzer, who is now working in investment banking, said the project

collapse of the property market, the consequent bankruptcy of the developer (who wanted to build a hotel complex adjoining the Independent) and the "12 months" taken by North Sydney Council in processing a development application.

He said that soon after the failure of the project, the Commonwealth Bank unexpectedly withdrew its support from the Trust

Yet John Lord credits the bank with "starting the Trust and saving it".

The Trust, which was set up to commemorate the Queen's first Australian tour, was established by the Federal

Government 35 years ago with the help of \$100,000 donation by the bank - and Mr Lord said the Trust would almost certainly have been wound up if the bank, its major creditor, had not written off a debt of \$3 million. But now that the Trust has been

rescued, what are its plans for the future? Its new chairman Mr Waddy said-

"It will continue to do what it's always done - help fledgling companies get established." He said the Trust booking

fell through because of the sudden service, Halftix, had continued to trade profitably throughout the period of provisional liquidation, as had its other booking service, which offers seats for shows ranging from rock to opera at special rates to Trust subscribers. The Trust will also resume respons

ibility for its arts superannuation scheme and a block booking service that enables arts groups to place advertisements at reduced rates.

Following the Trust's collapse, the Federal Government introduced a new system that allows sponsors to make tax-deductible donations directly to the arts companies of their choice, provid ing they are on the Government's list of approved arts groups

Mr Waddy said the Trust was seeking to be included on the Government list although in future it would seek spon sors' funds only for its own activities He said the Trust was busy re-estab

lishing itself and seeking new subscrib ers via its newsletter and supporters More detailed plans are not expected to be announced until a new adminis trator is appointed. The trust is stil being administered by a member o John Lord's staff, Mr Ken Weeks.

Chairman's Message

The August - September 1992 Trust News Issue Volume 92-1 contained information which was incorrect and inaccurate.

The Ticketek Agency operating at the Halftix Booth cannot take Pre-Bookings (ie, bookings before tickets go on sale generally) for any show.

The Trust does not have any preferential rights of access to the best seats available through the Ticketeck agency operating at the Halftix booth.

The rock and pop concerts information described as "Future Concerts Scheduled for the Near Future" are not confirmed in terms of either the specified artists or the specified venues, nor can the Trust Office take pre-bookings for these concerts.

The Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust unreservedly retracts all statements made in the Trust News relating to the above and apologises to Ticketek, the Sydney Entertainment Centre and also to the Trust members and all recipients of the publication for providing the incorrect information.


